The <u>Connecticut Appellate Court</u> will hear arguments in two cases on Thursday, March 9, at the <u>University</u> of <u>Connecticut School of Law</u>.



The visit is part of the Appellate Court's "On Circuit" program, which provides students, educators and the public with a greater understanding of appellate courts. Since the program began in 1996, the court has heard arguments at several high school and higher education locations.

Reading Room at the William F. Starr Hall, 45 Elizabeth St., Hartford. The first argument will start at 10 a.m. and the second at 11 a.m. Arguments for each case will last approximately 40 minutes. A question-and-answer period with counsel from the case and students will follow each argument.

Alvord is presiding judge for the arguments and will hear them with Judge Michael R. Sheldon and Judge Eliot D. Prescott.
- <u>Judge Alvord</u> graduated from the UConn School of Law in 1982; <u>Judge</u>
 <u>Prescott</u> in 1992. <u>Judge Sheldon</u> was a former professor of law at the school before becoming a judge and is a current adjunct professor of law at the school.

 media organizations may record, broadcast, televise or photograph the
 arguments in accordance with <u>Section 70-9 of the Connecticut Practice Book</u>
 and the Court's <u>protocol</u>.
